CHR will be in training starting January 29, 2024 through February 9, 2024, during this time the elderly program will temporarily

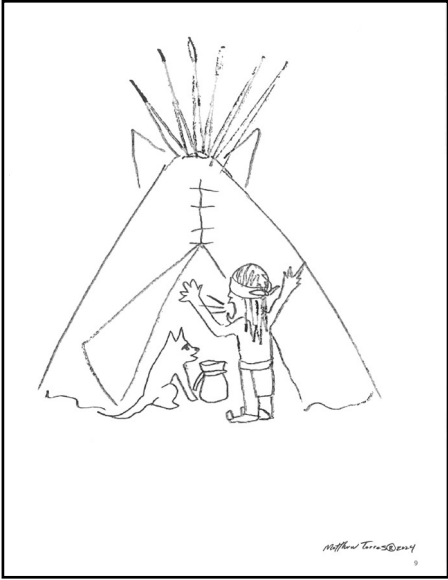
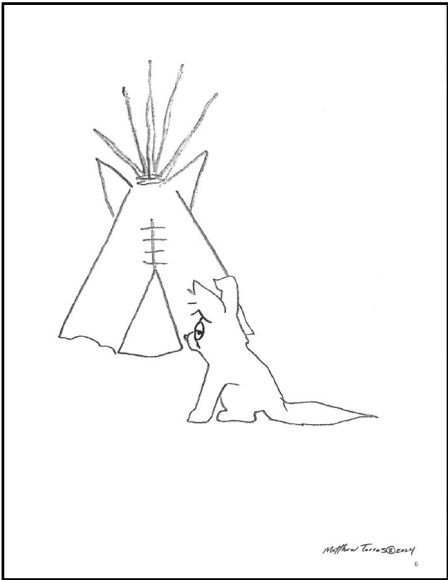
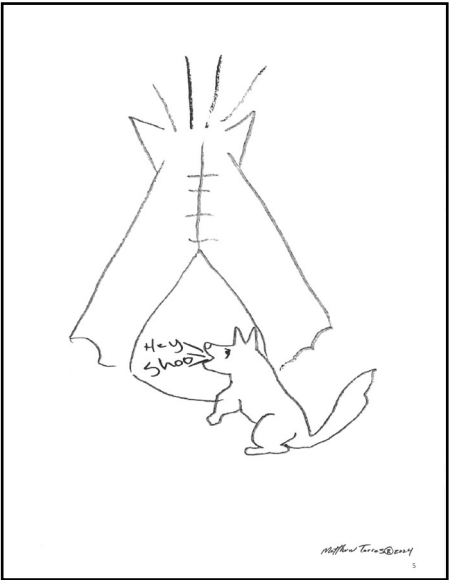
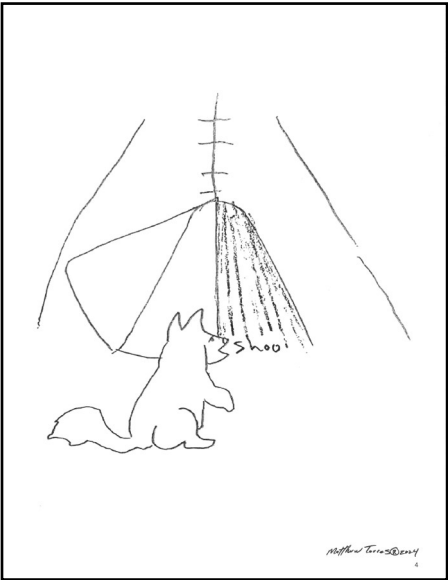
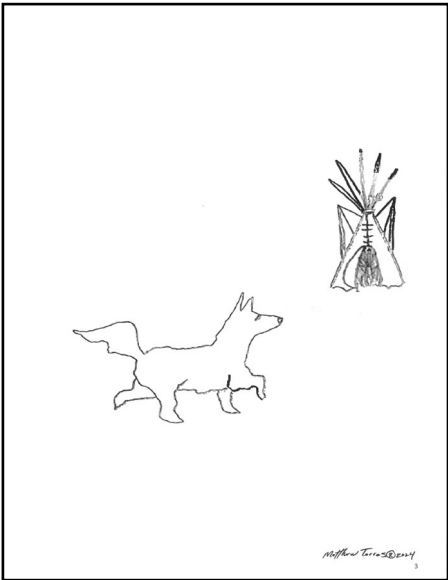
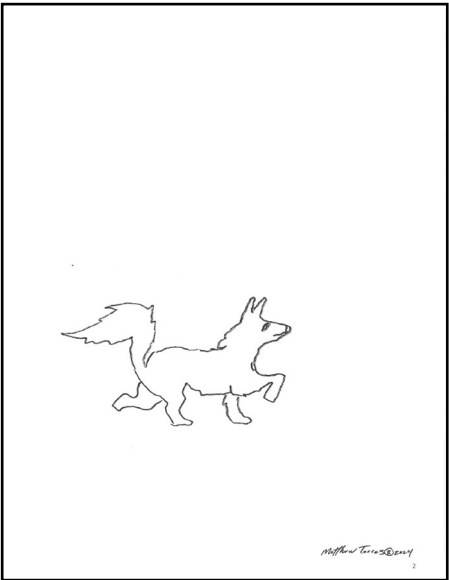
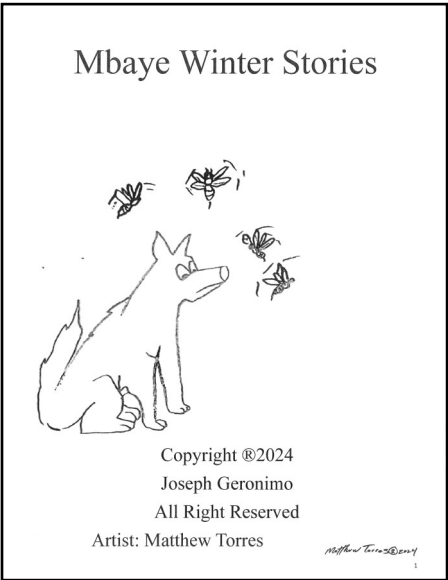
be providing transportation and medication delivery. For transportation, please give us a 24- hour notice.

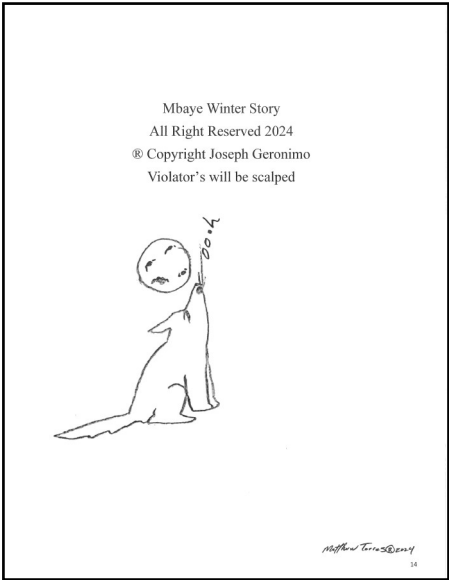
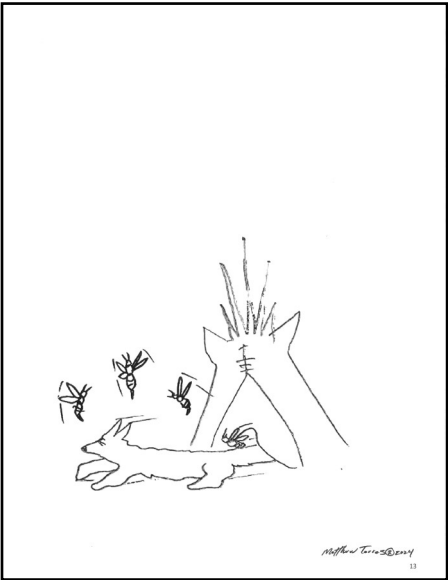
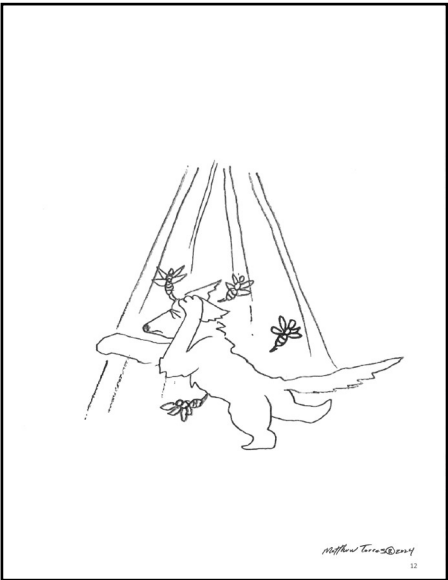
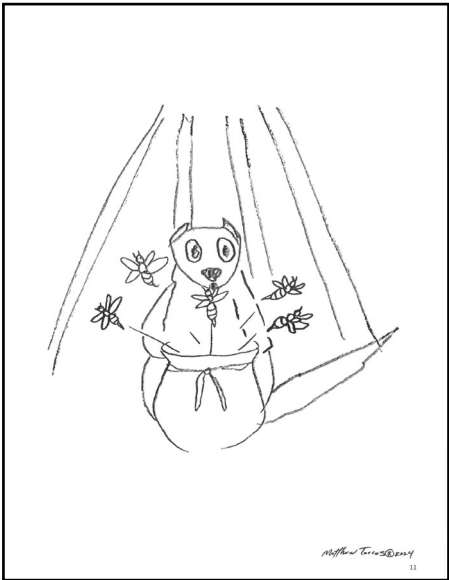

Two Paths

Throughout scripture we encounter a repeated theme: the path of the righteous and the path of the foolish. Psalm 1 in particular opens our eyes to these two paths. We also come face-to-face with this dynamic during the season of Lent when we think about Judas and his willingness to forego an eternal relationship with Christ in order to gain immediate gratification on the path of the foolish.

The Gospel of John puts it this way:

21 After saying this Jesus was troubled in spirit, and declared, "Very truly, I tell you, one of you will betray me." **22** The disciples looked at one another, uncertain of whom He was speaking. **23** One of His disciples—the one whom Jesus loved—was reclining next to Him; **24** Simon Peter therefore motioned to him to ask Jesus of whom He was speaking. **25** So while reclining next to Je-

sus, he asked Him, "Lord, who is it?" **26** Jesus answered, "It is the one to whom I give this piece of bread when I have dipped it in the dish." So, when He had dipped the piece of bread, He gave it to Judas son of Simon Iscariot. **27** After he received the piece of bread, Satan entered into him. (John 13:21-27)

Judas took the path of foolishness and in doing so traded away an eternity of joy. As a brief side note, the Gospel of Matthew tells us Judas betrayed Jesus for thirty pieces of silver. There is some discrepancy, but multiple historians have been able to agree that the thirty pieces of silver would approximately value around \$200 today. Judas took immediate gratification over eternal joy. To put it differently, he quit the race and took the easy way out. It reminds me of the following pas-

sage in the letter to the Hebrews:

1 Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, **2** fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. **3** Consider him who endured such opposition from sinners, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart. (Hebrews 12:1-3)

Judas didn't run the race with perseverance. Judas didn't fix his eyes on the pioneer and perfecter of faith. Jesus didn't consider how Christ would endure the cross and the opposition from crowds. Judas took the easy way out by em-

bracing immediate gratification and trading away an eternity of joy. In this season of Lent, it is my hope to avoid this path and instead intentionally pursue God with a growing sense of perseverance looking to Jesus on the path of righteousness.



RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM

INPATIENT PSYCHIATRIC PROGRAM

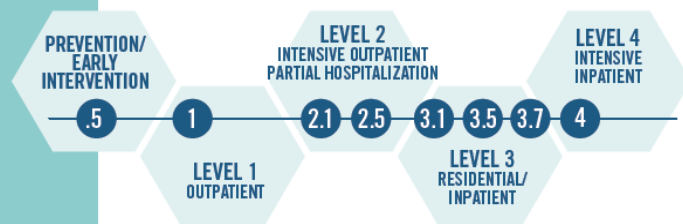

INTENSIVE OUTPATIENT PROGRAM

The Adolescent Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) is another level of care in our full continuum of mental health treatment for adolescents. It is a structured outpatient program that provides intensive therapeutic services while allowing adolescents to live at home and attend school or engage in other activities outside of treatment hours.

Mescalero Tribal Fish Hatchery

For December, the hatchery participated in the Mescalero Community Christmas Parade. Showcasing the new fish transport truck. This is an F-350 with a tank able to transport small fish deliveries up to 500 lbs.



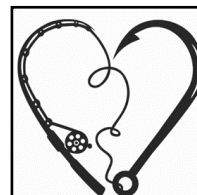
175 thousand trout eggs hatched in late December. They were transported from the incubation trays to larger concrete tanks. The hatched eggs are called "alevin." These alevins have an egg sac attached to them which they feed on.



The staff used sifters when setting the alevins into the concrete tanks. The sifters remove any dead eggs and fungus build-up and allow the live alevins to slip through the slots into the tanks. This is an interesting process and one that the staff are very familiar with. They take all the necessary precautions to keep the trout fry as safe as possible for a successful grow-out.

For January, the staff retrieved average lengths and total weights of the various fish LOT's on station. They also did a fish delivery to the Pueblo of Isleta.

Interesting Fact: Visitors ask us if the hatchery water freezes. No, the hatchery has a flow-through system. Water flows through the small fish tanks, to the raceways and out to the near-by creek.



Four Directions Treatment & Recovery Center

Recent News



The team at Four Directions Treatment and Recovery Center have been engaged in looking for ways to help our community in crisis and in growing in a good way through spirit, mind and body. With this focus we've looked for resources to assist in this path.

In 2023 we have found a strong supporter in Albuquerque Area Southwest Tribal Epidemiology Centers' (AASTEC) 988 program through the 988 Tribal Response Sub-award. We have several core activities where we are at several stages to implement promising procedures, resources, easy to understand processes in our mental health, emergency crisis system. We also are pleased to begin our community outreach as a resource that people can contact to re-

quest help with any overwhelming situation you find yourself in. We are all invested in wanting to help our loved ones if they are experiencing a heavy heart due to a great loss, a difficult change in life or are having relationship troubles. 988 is a confidential life line phone number here in New Mexico for emotional, mental or alcohol and drug misuse support. It also is more than this. Don't know where to turn because you are overwhelmed? Sometimes we just don't feel like talking on the phone. No matter the circumstances you can call or text 988. They have a chat online at www.988lifeline.org/chat. Text "TALK" to 988.

Is there a family or relationship issue weighing heavy on your mind? Do you have work or school stress? You can reach out to find support and talk with a skilled, compassionate counselor and has been trained to deal with these kinds of situations. Many other situations can be

brought to a 988 counselor for help. Do you have anxiety about money or housing? Maybe there's been a great loss, or you need help navigating through grief or experiencing loneliness. You can also call if you are concerned about a loved one.

988 accommodates those who are deaf, hard of hearing or blind. They can directly dial 988 on a video-phone or click the "ASL Now" button on 988lifeline.org to connect with someone who is trained in working with the Deaf and Hard of Hearing community.

What happens when you reach out to 988? You press 1 to connect with the Veterans Crisis line. Press 2 to connect to support in Spanish. Press 3 to connect to specialized LGBTQIA+ support. Or if you stay on the line, you'll reach a skilled and caring person who will listen to you in confidence and get you other support, if wanted. You will be heard and cared for. They are there to lis-

ten non-judgmentally and help you process your feelings, if that's the help you want.

This year watch for Four Directions staff hosting informational meetings around the community. We are enhancing our outreach and education of 988 phone number. We will be reaching out to young and old about this additional resource available to our people.

Job Summary

Ensures a safe, healthy and nurturing learning environment for children in which each child can develop his/her physical, social, emotional and intellectual skills.

This position description may not include all of the listed duties, nor do all of the listed examples include all tasks which may be found or assigned to this position.

Duties and Responsibilities

- Provides direct child care including educational, health, social, mental, and nutritional components.
- Develops and teaches lessons lesson plans. Develops, implements and oversees a routine for daily and general programming. Develops physical activities with both indoor and outside play and exercise.
- Individualizes one-to-one activities to reflect the unique needs and strengths of all children in the classroom. Coordinates special needs staff in the classroom and develops a collaborative approach that benefits all children in the classroom.
- Provides care to children six weeks to 12 years of age. Incorporates curriculum that is age appropriate for early child development.
- Provides nurturing and support to all children. Develops and maintains a caring, warm and trusting relationship with each child while enforcing appropriate disciplinary measures accordingly.
- Assists kids with self-serving healthy food and or eating snacks and meals.
- Ensures the safety of each child and monitor children in classroom, playground or assigned area.
- Provides supervision of classroom assistants, substitutes and/or volunteers.
- Maintains appropriate records as required by Tribal, State funding and licensing agencies. Completes appropriate records including: daily infant intake forms, child/teacher ratio sheets, medical log and medicine log and medicine dispensing forms, accident report forms and logs, infant/toddler feeding/sleeping and changing form, in-service and continuing education forms.
- Maintains an orderly, attractive and stimulating physical environment for young children.
- Cleans, maintains and sanitizes for a safe and secure environment, designing and constructing bulletin boards and other displays, monitoring equipment, maintaining supplies, and informing the supervisor of supplies needed.
- Maintains an open rapport with parents, guardians and family members.
- Participates in activities such as dancing, singing, acting, reading and role playing.
- Supervises and monitors children and deals with disruptive children, while providing fair but firm discipline.
- Responds to crisis or emergency situations that may occur following program approved procedures.
- Assists older children with homework.
- Provides infant care; changing, feeding, rocking if working in infant room.
- Performs other duties as assigned.

- High School Diploma or GED.
- One year experience working with children.
- Associates Degree in Early Childhood Development preferred.
- Bilingual English/Apache preferred.
- Must be 18 years of age or older.
- CPR and First Aid Certified.
- Must obtain and maintain Food Handler's Card.
- Must be able to pass a physical exam within 45 days of hire.
- Must have a valid NM Driver's License.
- Must be able to work a nine hour day with a lunch.
- Must be willing to work an evenings, weekends and holidays.
- Must successfully pass a pre-employment drug/alcohol screen and background investigation.

Tribal preference and Native American Indian preference shall apply to all positions.

Knowledge, Skills and Abilities

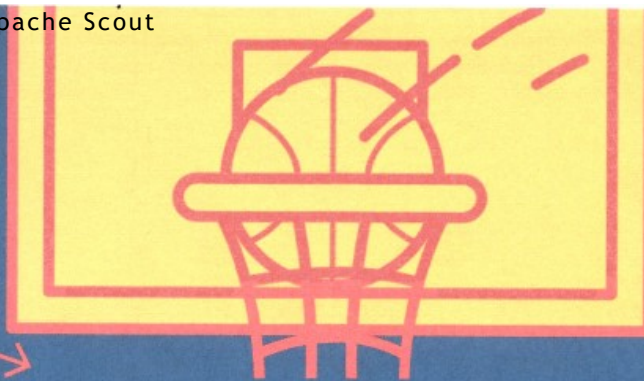
- Knowledge of occupational hazards and applicable safety practices.
- Knowledge of principles and practices of early childhood development and care.
- Knowledge of proper and safe food handling, storage, and disposal requirements.
- Skill in operating various word-processing, spreadsheets and database software programs.
- Skill in nurturing, motivating, teaching and guiding children.
- Skill in displaying mature, patient, and understanding behavior.
- Ability to supervise and ensure a safe learning environment for children in a classroom setting.
- Ability to adapt curriculum to meet the needs of all children including "at-risk", special needs, gifted, and culturally diverse populations.
- Ability to use excellent communication skills with especially good listening skills.
- Ability to respond to and remain calm in an emergency or crisis situations.
- Ability to establish and maintain professional relationships with individuals of varying social and cultural backgrounds and with co-workers at all levels.
- Ability to respect the dignity of each family, culture, customs and beliefs.
- Ability to work professionally and cooperatively with staff, parents, and community members
- Ability to maintain confidentiality.

Physical Demands

While performing the duties of this job, the employee regularly is required to stand; walk; use hands to finger, handle, or feel; and reach with hands and arms above shoulder level. The employee frequently is required to stoop, kneel, crouch, or crawl; and talk or hear. The employee occasionally is required to sit; climb or balance; and smell. The employee occasionally lifts children. The employee must lift and/or move up to 50 pounds.

Work Environment:

Work is generally performed in a childcare center, classroom environment and outdoors with high noise level. Exposure to bodily fluids, urine, or feces of babies or infants and small children. Exposure to unpleasant odors and infectious disease. Exposure to natural weather conditions and various dusts and mists may occur while performing outdoor duties. Evening, weekend, and/or holiday work will be required. Extended hours and irregular shifts may be required.

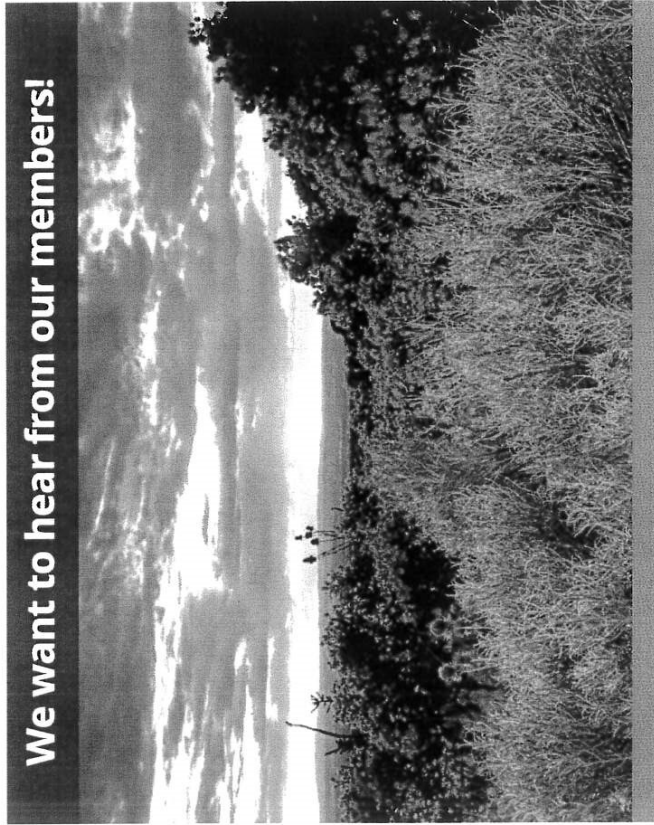
